GAZETTE OF 3 NOVEMBER 1838

The Embossed Letter Sheet

The New South Wales Government Gazette of 3 November 1838 carried the following notice:

His Excellency the Governor, in order to effect a reduction in postage on such communications intended for delivery within the limits of the town of Sydney, has been pleased to sanction their transmission under envelope which may be obtained at the GPO on payment of one shilling and threepence per dozen.



Rate

One penny local delivery due to rate reduction on 14.1.1841 from 1½d each to 1d each (1 shilling per dozen).

Route

Posted in town letter receiver and delivered within Sydney town.

Markings

"FREE" (11.5.1846, type F5) denoting free of further postage. "1 OCLOCK" (type T4).

Cover was turned and re-used in reply to the Australian Assurance Office, rated "2" (type X2) unpaid and back-stamped "GPO SYDNEY" (12.5.1846, type S9).

Intercolonial Ship Letter Mail

Van Diemen's Land

The Act of 1825 established a special ship letter rate to Van Diemen's Land at 3d single which remained unchanged throughout this period.

Threepence prepaid General Ship Letter, rated "1/1" in black at Launceston (4d inward ship letter plus 9d mileage).

Route

Sydney to Launceston per "Meteor", arriving on 12.5.1839. Conveyed overland to Hobart.

Markings

Rate

"Paid 6d" in Adelaide. Ms. "3" in black denotes inwards Ship Letter rate due on delivery in Sydney.

Route

NEW ZEALAND

Under New South Wales Jurisdiction

In 1830 the European population of New Zealand was no more than 330 souls, rising to 2,000 by 1838.

New Zealand's postal system was informally organised by New South Wales from the early 1830's and formally from 1840.



20 May 1830 - Earliest recorded cover from New Zealand showing NSW transit markings.

Rate: NSW Ship Letter Rate 4d paid, and "1/-" inwards UK postage due (4d India Letter plus 8d mileage).

Route: Entire letter from the Wesleyan Mission Station, headed "Mangunga, Hokianga". Written by White, Hobbs and Stack, it details the problems of trade with the Maoris and the proliferation of muskets. Per schooner "Prince of Denmark", sailing from the Bay of Islands, NZ, on 7.6.1830. Arrived at Sydney on 18.6.1830. Per private ship to England.

Markings: "SYDNEY / POST PAID" (type P1), "SYDNEY / NSW" (22.6.1830, type S2), and "INDIA LETTER / PORTSMOUTH".

On reverse: London date-stamp (24.11.1830).

NEW ZEALAND

Under New South Wales Jurisdiction 1840-1841

A proclamation in the NSW Government Gazette on 18 January 1840 brought New Zealand under the control of NSW. The Legislative Council passed an Act extending the laws of NSW to NZ on 16 June 1840. Separation from New South Wales was proclaimed on 3 May 1841.



26 December 1840

Free because addressee entitled to franking privilege.

Route

By the brig "Nimrod" from the Bay of Islands, NZ, to Sydney.



THE MORETON BAY DISTRICT

Under New South Wales Jurisdiction

The Moreton Bay District comprised what is now the State of Queensland, and was first settled in September 1824 as a penal settlement. On 4.5.1842 the Moreton Bay District was opened to free settlement, and became Queensland in December 1859.

Packet rate "1/-" prepaid in UK.
Rated 7d (3d inwards ship plus 4d local ship letter)
due on arrival.

Per Toulmin Packet "Ann Grant", sailing from Gravesend on 1.11.1844, and arriving at Sydney on 11.3.1845. Per "S.S. Sovereign" departing Sydney on 14 March, and arriving at Brisbane on 19.3.1845.

Date-stamps for Old Rain (26.10.1844) and London (27.10.1844).

26 October 1844

Brisbane: The 1832 GPO Directory lists a Post Office at Moreton Bay, however it is noted as a new Post Office from 1.1.1841. Renamed Brisbane around April 1843.

Prepaid 4d intracolonial ship letter rate. **Route**

Sent per Hunter River Steam Navigation Co. vessel "S.S. Tamar" departing Brisbane on 14.11.1848, and arriving in Sydney on 18.11.1848.

THE MORETON BAY DISTRICT

Under New South Wales Jurisdiction

Ipswich: Post Office opened 2 January 1846.

Handstamps do not appear to have issued to Post Offices other than Brisbane before 1848.



22 August 1847

Rate

Ms. "Ship Letter Paid 1/1" (6d Inland Letter plus 4d Local & 3d General ship Letter rates). "1/-" inwards packet letter rate due on arrival.

Route

Ipswich to Brisbane by road, then by coastal vessel to Sydney. Per Toulmin Packet "Sunflower" departing Sydney on 12.9.1847 and arriving at Gravesend on 5.2.1848.

Markings

"PAID SHIP LETTER / SYDNEY" (9.9.1847, type SL2).

On reverse: Ms. "P.O. Ipswich / 22nd May 1847". "BRISBANE / NEW.S.WALES" (25.8.1847, type C67). London date-stamp (5.2.1848).

In 1836 the New South Wales Governor declared the Port Phillip district open for settlement. The first postmaster of Melbourne was appointed in 1837.

Melbourne: Post Office opened 13 April 1837.



22 April 1838 - Second earliest recorded use of Port Phillip handstamps.

Rate: Ms. "1/s" (2 x 4d Local Ship Letter plus the 4d double Ship Letter rate) in red. Ms. "1/-" in black denotes inwards UK postage due (4d India Letter plus 8d mileage). Signed by William Lonsdale.

Route: Melbourne to Sydney by local vessel to Sydney, and then forwarded per private ship to Great Britain.

Markings: "MELBOURNE / NSW" (type C37) and "MELBOURNE / PAID" (earliest recorded example, type P16).

On reverse: "GPO SYDNEY" (12.5.1838, type S6), "INDIA LETTER / GRAVESEND" and date-stamp for London (25.9.1838). e.

Overland Mail

Rate

One Shilling & Threepence unpaid for a distance greater than 500 miles.

Route

Parramatta to Melbourne, via Yass, carried by horse per Overland Mail.
