

# Four Pence Beaded Oval of Victoria, 1860 to 1863

## Introduction

The electros used to print the 4<sup>d</sup> Emblems were coming to the end of their usable life. On December 1<sup>st</sup> 1859, Frederick Grosse was given an order to produce a die for the 4<sup>d</sup> Beaded Oval. The die was produced at a cost of £12 and was delivered on February 13<sup>th</sup> 1860. These stamps were in high demand to pay the 4<sup>d</sup> Intra-Colony rate, this high demand resulted in various papers being used as well as the issuing of rouletted and imperforate stamps. The Beaded oval design was much maligned in regard to its artistic merit and the wording on the stamp was too small to be easily read.

## Purpose and Scope of Exhibit

This exhibit tells the story of the 4d Beaded Oval and the measures used to maintain a constant supply of these stamps. Goldfields Mail is included to show a gap in the Postal Network was covered by an enterprising business. Marginal Inscriptions are a much overlooked part of the Beaded Oval story. Also shown are the various papers used and the emergency methods of separation used while the perforating was being repaired. Through to when the 4<sup>d</sup> Beaded Oval was replaced by the 4<sup>d</sup> Laureated stamp.

## Rarity Statement

In this exhibit the largest known multiple is shown and a reconstructed block of 12 with an almost complete Marginal Inscription. Items that have 1 to 4 known examples, are mounted within a **double line burgundy frame**, items that have 5 to 15 known examples, are mounted within a **single line burgundy frame**. Rarity has been established by referring to, Kellow: The Stamps of Victoria and my personal research. A © indicates the item has a certificate. Plate positions are shown as [C1].

## Goldfields Mail

Victoria Express, S. Callou & Co

### Goldfields Express Mail.

Sent Via Victoria Express, S. Callou & Co / Stationers of Inglewood. A shortage of Post Offices in the Goldfields, created an opportunity for enterprising shopkeepers. For the Express Post fee of 1/- a letter would be carried to a Post Office and posted to the destination. There are only two recorded examples of the Victoria Express handstamp.



Folded entire from New Inglewood to Melbourne,

Four Pence Beaded Oval, Rose Pink on Thick Course Paper No Watermark Perforated 12, tied by Barred Numeral 296 of New Inglewood.

Backstamped VICTORIA EXPRESS / S.CALLOU & CO / STATIONERS / News & Letter Agent / &Co / INGLEWOOD also a manuscript 1 in red to signifying that the express fee of 1/- had been paid, this partly obscured by the flap. This item was subsequently posted at New Inglewood, backstamp NEW INGLEWOOD / AU 21 / 60 / VICTORIA and arrival handstamp MELBOURNE / A / AU 23 / 60 Ex Silvasich.



## Goldfields Mail

Victoria Express, S. Callou & Co

### Goldfields Express Mail.

Sent Via Victoria Express, S. Callou & Co/Stationers of Inglewood. The continuing shortage of Post Offices in the Goldfields, allowed enterprising shopkeepers to continue this service. In late in 1860 the Post Office put pressure on the service and had it discontinued. There are only two recorded examples of the Victoria Express handstamp.

Cover sent from Sandy Creek to Melbourne,

Four Pence Beaded Oval, Rose-pink on Saunders FOUR PENCE Watermark Paper, Perforated 12, tied by Barred Numeral 116 of Sandy Creek, also on front a red line to signifying that the express fee of 1/- had been paid.

Backstamped SANDY CREEK / ■ / MY\*3 / 1860 / VICTORIA also MELBOURNE / A / MY 4 / 60 plus another red line to signifying that the express fee of 1/- had been paid. Ex Dubois.

## Marginal Inscription



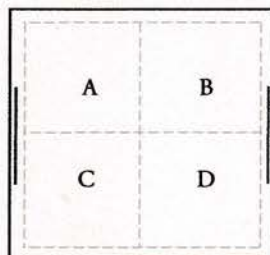

Inscriptions are centred on vertical sides only, positioned next to the gutter. Next to stamp positions in the left margin are C7, C1, A25, A19 and A13. In the right it is next to stamp positions in the left margin are B18, B24, B30, D6, D12 and D18.

Robinson introduced Marginal Inscriptions while printing the Emblems and continued to include the Marginal Inscriptions in the side margins on the Beaded Oval sheets. The purpose of the marginal inscription is to help with accounting, Post Office staff had to regularly total up the value of stamps they held.



## Marginal Inscription

Saunders FOUR PENCE Watermark Paper, Rose-pink, Perforated 12



Used block of 24 with Original Gum, with left and bottom margins attached.

The left margin has a partial Marginal Inscription ONE HUNDRED AN  
Left margin has a VICTOR watermark and the bottom margin has a VICTORIA watermark.

All are cancelled by KA 1 cancel of Melbourne in black. The reason for cancelling stamps with intact gum, could be to pay bulk postage or possibly for usage as Specimens.

This is the largest known multiple. Ex Pack, Forster, Perry, Dubois.



## Marginal Inscription

De La Rue Single Line 4 Watermark Paper, Dull Rose, Perforated 12

Marginal Inscriptions were in use for the full time that Beaded Oval stamps were printed.

Marginal Inscriptions were only on the sides of sheets, reading upwards in the left margin and downwards in the right margin.

The full Marginal Inscription read, ONE HUNDRED AND TWENTY STAMPS IN EACH SHEET. VALUE TWO POUNDS.

For some unknown reason, the 4<sup>d</sup> Beaded Oval is the only stamp where the marginal inscription is in all capital letters.

This is a reconstructed block of 12, consisting of a block of 6, plus a block of 4, plus a pair.

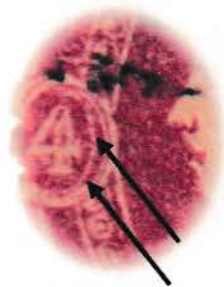
This Unused block shows some staining from the deep brown gum.

It is interesting to mention that the reason for there being 120 stamps in a sheet is because there were 240 Pennies in a Pound. Ex Perry, Hackmey.

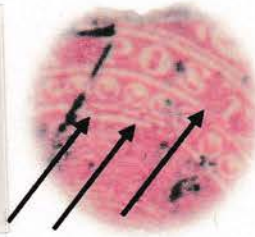
Double Strike on the oval around the left 4.

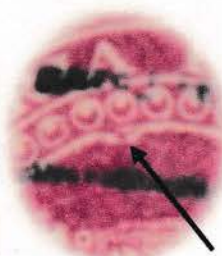

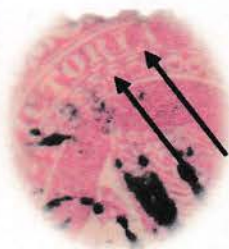


The late arrival of the FOUR PENCE watermark paper prompted a discussion use up the remaining stock of Bordeaux paper on the 4<sup>d</sup> Beaded Ovals, there were only 720,000 printed on the Bordeaux paper. This paper is very thin, sometimes referred to as 'Pelure Paper' which is best described as crisp hard thin paper, it is much thinner than other papers being only 60 µm thick. The earliest known date of use is April 21<sup>st</sup> 1860.



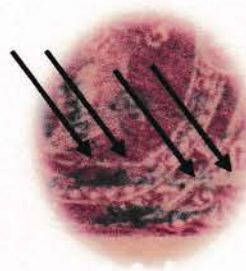

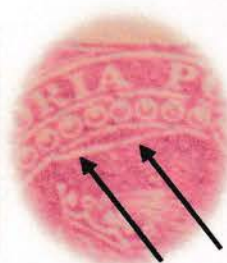

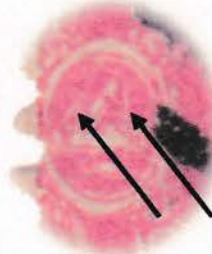

Delays with the FOUR PENCE watermark paper, together with all the Bordeaux Paper having been used, it was necessary to use this Thicker Courser Paper. A printing of only 180,000 stamps was delivered on July 16<sup>th</sup> 1860, this was a sufficient supply to take the Post Office through to July 31<sup>st</sup> 1860, when the first of the FOUR PENCE watermarked stamps were delivered. This was the last Victoria stamp printed on No Watermark Paper.

FOUR PENCE watermark paper was used to print 4<sup>d</sup> stamps in four shades, Rose-pink, Rose-red, Rose-carmine and Dull Rose. There was a total of 7,740,000 printed between July 1860 and July 1862.

Deep brown gum that was used, caused permanent staining on some stamps.

Strip of 3 tied by BN 4 Sandhurst also on cover is a handstamp SANDHURST / MA 25 / 61 / VICTORIA  
also an arrival stamp LONDON / DY / MY 13 / 61 / PAID in red and a manuscript Via Marseilles  
Backstamped MELBOURNE / H / MA 25 / 61



Folded entire sent from Raglan to Ballarat.

This the intended use of the 4<sup>d</sup> Beaded Oval, to prepay intra-colony mail.

Tied by BN 97 Raglan also there is a transferred impression of the Ballarat arrival stamp.  
Backstamped RAGLAN / FE 17 / 61 / VICTORIA and arrival stamp BALLARAT / D / FE 18 / 61 / VICTORIA

All the usable sheets of FOUR PENCE Watermark paper had been used up and the delivery of Single Line 4 Watermark paper had not arrived from De La Rue. It was decided to use up the Saunders FIVE SHILLINGS Watermark paper, there were only 360,000 printed on the Saunders FIVE SHILLINGS Watermark paper.

Also on this cover is a 2<sup>d</sup> Emblems, Pale Slate on THREE PENCE Watermark Paper Perforated 12, both are tied by duplex handstamps GEELONG / 1 A / JU 25 / 63.

Arrival backstamp A / TAUNTON / AU 2[x] / 63 Ex Molnar.

Eventually the Single Line 4 Watermark paper arrived from De La Rue, the first delivery of the 4<sup>d</sup> stamps arrived at the Post Office on October 9<sup>th</sup> 1862. There were 3,360,000 printed in Dull Rose-pink, Dull Rose or Rose-red.

During July and August 1863, the perforating machine was out of use for repair. When the need for 4<sup>d</sup> stamps became urgent it was decided to Roulette 4<sup>d</sup> stamps for use at Melbourne. Less than 160,000 of these stamps were Rouletted in this Emergency rouletting, for the Melbourne G.P.O.

During July and August 1863, while the perforating machine was being repaired, the 4<sup>d</sup> stamps could not be rouletted fast enough to supply everywhere. As an emergency measure it was decided to supply Imperforate 4<sup>d</sup> stamps, these were supplied to Post Offices in Ballarat, Buninyong, Geelong, Sandhurst, Streatham and Wallan Wallan.

The only multiples recorded are less than 25 used pairs.

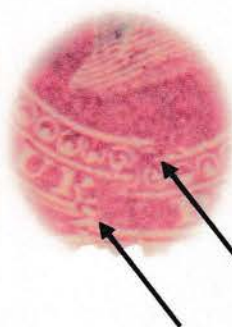

After being used for 3 years and 5 months to print a total of 12,360,000 stamps, it was decided, the 4<sup>d</sup> Beaded Oval would be replaced. In September 1863 the 4<sup>d</sup> Laureate was introduced bringing the story of the 4<sup>d</sup> Beaded Oval to a close.
