

The two pence Emblems were not urgently required as there was sufficient stock of the two pence Queen on Throne stamps, so the production of the electros was delayed till there were sufficient stocks of one penny and four pence Emblems. The two pence Emblem was issued on May 25<sup>th</sup> 1857 in two shades Pale Lilac and Grey-lilac.

In August 1857 the Post Office purchased a single wheel Rouletter, with a notched wheel having a gauge of 6½ to 7½. To be used by the GPO sales clerks, often only rouletted two sides and, occasionally only one edge was rouletted. Characteristically the roulettes from the single wheel device are out off parallel or are curved.

On August 17<sup>th</sup> 1857 a Multi Wheel Raymond Rouletter was purchased, having a gauge of 7½ to 9. The Raymond Rouletter is sometimes referred to as a 'rolling pin' rouletter, it consisted of a bar with a series of notched wheels, with spacers between. This was rolled across the sheet with a downward force, rouletting half the width of the sheet. To change the spacing of the notched wheels everything had to be disassembled and reassembled with the other spacers between the wheels, a time consuming process, hence many of these stamps are rouletted in only one direction.

There are only 4 used examples known, all are cancelled at the G.P.O. These look like a pair, but are 2 singles rejoined as they were on the original cover, curiously they are both imperforate on the left edge. Most likely explanation for the Serration is an experiment by Calvert, for his October 1857 contract to perforate stamps. The post office did not specify what style of perforation, so there was some experimentation on these and the 6<sup>d</sup> Woodblock, Calvert chose to purchase a Raymond Rouletter for rouletting these stamps.

These were printed by Calvert in May 1857 and then perforated by Robinson after April 12<sup>th</sup> 1859. The only explanation is a few imperforate sheets were located, after it was normal to perforate sheets and were then perforated. There are only 2 pairs and less than 14 single stamps known, the only unused example has not been recorded since the 1920's. All known examples used were cancelled either BN 1 Melbourne, BN 2 Geelong or BN 3 Castlemaine.



There are only 2 examples known. This 2<sup>d</sup> Pale Lilac matches the shade used by Calvert in his 1857 printings, however it is on Vertically Laid paper, not the issued good quality wove paper. The logical explanation for this is that Calvert printed plate proofs on sheets of vertically laid paper, one plate proof sheet later found its way into the stock of sheets to be rouletted by Robinson. The other known example is on an almost identical cover, also sent on October 16<sup>th</sup> 1858 and also was addressed to Glasgow, the roulette pulls on the bottom of that proof fit with the roulette pulls on the top of this proof, verifying that this proof was directly below the other in the plate proof sheet.



This shade may have been the first printing on the new paper and then shade was rejected for being too pale, after only a very few sheets were printed.

On 25-11-1857 tenders were called, with a requirement to use the electros already purchased to Print, Gum and Roulette 2,500,000 of the 1<sup>d</sup> stamps. Calvert made the first delivery under this contract on 01-01-1858. There were 2,483,754 of the 1<sup>d</sup> stamps delivered in Pale Emerald Green and Emerald Green.


Calvert was handed a quantity off the 6<sup>d</sup> woodblocks to roulette, however it was soon discovered that Calvert had pawned these plus some 4<sup>d</sup> Emblems. 





The sudden dismissal of Samuel Calvert created an urgent problem for the Post Office, Mr. Francis W. Robinson was quickly contracted to print stamps. Robinson was inexperienced at Electrotype printing, but supply of 4<sup>d</sup> stamps had run out, Robinson needed to start printing them immediately. His mistake was to use 'Oily Ink' which does not work well with the electrotype process. He printed about 20,000 stamps on the poor quality wove paper, before it ran out and was replaced with the smooth vertically laid paper, onto which he printed about 40,000 stamps before he sourced the 'Non-oily Ink' suitable for electrotype printing. For expediency these first printings were pressed into service imperforate. Pairs are Largest Known in Oily Ink.
