DISASTER FOR KNILM AND KLM



KNILM (Royal Netherlands Indies' Airways 1928-1947) and KLM, a completely separate company, operated services to Australasia from the 1930s. Their reliability was impressive, partly due to their use of Douglas and Lockheed all-metal aircraft from the USA. KNILM were based in Batavia, Java, where the KLM service from Amsterdam terminated, and KNILM continued with a service to Sydney.

Following the demise of KNILM, their aircraft and assets were taken over by KLM which then operated through to Australia from Amsterdam.


Whilst the punctuality and safety record of both airlines was excellent, they were not immune from disaster and mail recovered from an accident suffered by each airline is shown.

Both engines cut out shortly after the KNILM Lockheed PK-AFO took off from Denpasar aerodrome, Bali. The aircraft struck the sea about 70m from the shore and was destroyed. Three of the crew and all five passengers died. One crew member survived with a broken spine and other injuries


The addressee, Nancy-Bird Walton (1915-2009) became a fully qualified pilot at 19, so being the youngest Australian woman to gain a pilot's licence. After a spell of barnstorming, she set up a flying medical service in 1935. Later she did promotional work for KLM (1938-39) and founded the Australian Women Pilots' Association in 1950

This cover is addressed to Mr J H Mijnlieff, the KNILM representative in Sydney. Tragically, his wife was a passenger on the aircraft which crashed, and she was killed.

The letter would have been delivered to the KNILM office in Sydney on Thursday 25 January. Having been informed of the death of his wife, Mr Mijnlieff requested that her body be sent to Sydney.

The aircraft, Amsterdam to Sydney, departed Karachi at 2111 on 22 March. When 54 km from Bangkok, the aircraft developed engine problems; then a propeller blade separated from the number 3 engine when 8 km from Bangkok. This caused a fire in the engine nacelle. The aircraft landed on runway 21/03, the right main gear collapsed, and a major fire broke out which destroyed the aircraft. The 10 crew and 34 passengers escaped.

The Lockheed Constellation L749 PH-TFF Venlo left Amsterdam on 21 March carrying mail for Australasia from Belgium, Czechoslovakia, Denmark, Eastern Germany, Finland, Holland, Norway, Poland, Sweden and the USSR.

Apart from Australasia, destinations for the mail included Hong Kong, Japan, Thailand, Malaya and Indonesia

There was a substantial delay of over five weeks between the incident and salvaged mail being delivered to the Australasian mail centres for processing. Most of the mail was returned to Amsterdam before re-forwarding, its fragile state requiring careful treatment

The various explanatory labels attached to mail in Amsterdam were typed and duplicated. The process involved typing the message several times onto a stencil, duplicating and cutting a strip for each label, apparently with scissors, between 10 and 20 per sheet.



The probable cause was the failure of the propeller-blade during flight shortly before landing at Don Muang Airport. This caused the loss of No 3 engine and fire to break out in the engine nacelle which could not be extinguished. When landing, the right main landing gears collapsed as a consequence of the fire (World Airline Accident Summary CAP479, UK Civil Aviation Authority)
